

CONNEMARA & MAYO

Guided Walking Tour 2007

This is a one centre based tour, staying in the beautiful market town of Westport. From here we will travel to Connemara and to the island of Clare to mention but a few of the beautiful walking areas that offer an authentic and unhurried Irish experience on foot at an easy pace.

Westport is special; it is the essence of Irelands magical west. Nestling under the shadow of Croagh Patrick, overlooking Clew Bay and its enchanting islands, the town weaves its spell around everyone it meets. It has the distinction of being one of the few planned towns in Ireland and its design and layout are credited to James Wyatt (1746 - 1813) an English architect who made his name with his Neo-classical design for the London Pantheon.

Transfers:	All associated transfers to and from walks.

Meeting Point:	A representative will meet you at the bus station or train station in Westport.
Departure Point:	You depart from Westport

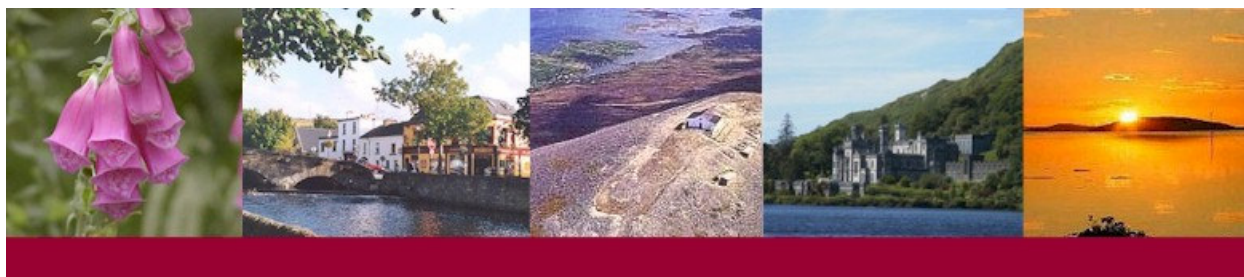

DAILY ITINERARY

DAY 1

Arrive to Westport and your hotel accommodation. Meet your guide at 6.30 in the Hotel bar for a briefing of the coming weeks activities with dinner served immediately afterwards. For anyone who wants some musical entertainment, Westport is a veritable Mecca for traditional music.

DAY 2 (Walk Details: 11km, 900 feet of gradual ascent)

A 75-minute transfer to the North side of Clew Bay and visit Achill Island, Ireland's largest offshore Island now connected to the mainland by the Michael Davitt Bridge. Achill has been a favourite destination for many writers and artists over the years, namely Graham Greene and Paul Henry who first came to Achill for a two week holiday in 1910 and stayed for 9 years. Our hike starts at the western end of the Island underneath Corraun Mountain and finishes at the deserted village at Slievemore. A height gain of 900 feet is attained and 4 hours approx is the normal for this 11km hike.



DAY 3 (Walk Details: 8 miles, good track, very little ascent with no moor or bog).

Transferring south to Connemara where you will visit Kylemore Abbey (please note a small fee of about Euro 10.00 applies to enter the Abbey and Cathedral.) with its completely restored Victorian Gardens, The Abbey, now a girls boarding school, is run by the Benedictine nuns. The Abbey itself was built by a business man called Mitchell Henry who, while honeymooning in the area, fell in love with the unspoiled natural charm of the valley and decided to build a home there. The chapel in the grounds is a miniaturized replica of Norwich Cathedral. The tour, which is self guided, should take no longer than two hours. Afterwards you are transferred to the head of an old track, which is part of the Western Way. Here you will have an excellent view of the quartzite 12 Bens Mountains and an opportunity to take some photographs of Killary Harbour

DAY 4 (Walk Details: 8 miles, 1750 feet, uphill climb on a loose stoned, pilgrim track, small section of bog and country lanes)

The wonderful quartzite coned mountain of Croagh Patrick has been a sacred place for almost 5000 years. Croagh Patrick is Ireland's holy mountain where Patrick, the patron saint, spent 40 days and nights praying and fasting in 441AD. There is an annual pilgrimage to Croagh Patrick on the last Sunday in July. The climb is more difficult at the top, but once you get there, the views overlooking Clew Bay to the north, and the 12 Bens of Connemara to the south is spectacular. .

DAY 5 (Free day: Golf* / Angle** / Shop (Optional Extras))

Today is your Free Day. Some of the many things you can do are golfing, fishing and horse riding but they need to be booked in advance and transport organized to get there and back. It also gives you the opportunity to catch up on your emails and laundry. Another option could be taking the scenic coach tour that departs Westport at 10.30 am (July and August). Dinner tonight is left to your own choice and in Westport there is a wide range of ethnic restaurants to choose from.

DAY 6 (Trip by ferry to Clare Island)

To day we take a short sailing to Clare Island this morning. Clare Island is synonymous with Grace O' Malley, the formidable ruler of the Clew Bay district during the second half of the 16th century. One of the most interesting places on the island is the remains of the late 12th century Cistercian Friary, founded by the Monks of Abbeyknockmoy in Co Galway. According to local folklore, following the death of Grace O' Malley in 1603, her remains were interred in the decorated O'Malley wall tomb in the Friary. The Chancel Vault was once covered in wall paintings, patches of which remain. The walk will take you to northernmost end of the island before returning to the quayside for the return ferry. (Please note that the crossing to the island is subject to wind and weather conditions and may, in some cases be taken earlier in the week at the discretion of the guide.)

DAY 7 (Walk Details : Killary Harbour: 6 miles, no ascent, good track but wet and boggy in places.

A one-hour drive South takes you to the head of Ireland's only fiord – Killary Harbour. You will walk on an old famine road that was built by the starving Irish peasants during the great famine 1845 – 1849. On the route you will clearly see the ruins of famine villages and lazy beds, the name given to the potato ridges where the starving peasant Irish tried to provide food for his family. By mid-afternoon, you will be dropped back in Westport for some last minute shopping etc.

DAY 8

Departure after breakfast. If you are planning to return to the USA on Saturday please be advised to schedule your flight for after 1:00 PM.
